


The Bronze Age
History
of the
Palace of Nestor
at Pylos

Extraordinary preservation and an abundance of recovered artifacts have made Pylos the chief site for the study of Mycenaean palaces in Bronze Age Greece. Well-built walls and plaster floors clearly define interior rooms, many of which, when excavated in the 1950s-1960s, still contained their original contents--brightly colored frescoes, pottery, sculpture, bronze tools and Linear B-inscribed clay tablets. Renewed investigations have shed new light on the phases of construction of the palace, particularly valuable as Mycenaean palaces were short-lived phenomena. Untangling the many remodelings and additions at Pylos reveals a much longer building history than originally thought and points to an architectural sequence unlike other palaces, with a surprising early influence from the Minoan civilization on Crete.
