### **Works in Progress**

*The First White Flight: Industrial Pollution and Racial Segregation in New South Cities*: this monograph project uncovers the nineteenth-century roots of white flight in the South. It argues that whites began abandoning urban centers amid the growth of extractive industries and the subsequent emergence of industrial pollution as early as the 1870s. Concerns over waste, disease, and air quality drove whites to form separate and eventually unequal communities in areas better isolated from industrial development. Within these newly racialized urban geographies, minority populations disproportionately bore the environmental risk of industrialization, creating a cycle in which polluted neighborhoods remained the poorest neighborhoods.

“Dying Hogs and Thieving Freedmen: Southern Print Culture and Racial Control after the Civil War”: an article-length manuscript partially drafted and intended for *Environmental History*. Subscription-only journals such as *The Southern Planter* and *The Southern Cultivator* were the primary sources of agricultural science and chemistry for southern farmers from the 1840s onward. This paper argues that particular print culture harnessed post-emancipation racial tension to further agricultural reform initiatives, ultimately legitimizing planters’ efforts to deny freedpeople access to vital economic resources during the transition to tenancy and sharecropping.
